

Proficiency Credit

Another opportunity to receive college credit is through proficiency testing. This can be done through departmental examinations or CLEP testing. Proficiency credit can be received in subjects such as English, economics, history, and math. Students interested in proficiency testing should contact the testing Center at (708) 709-3558 for test dates and applicable fees.

Free Class for High School Seniors

Students can try college life by taking a class at PSC with no charge for tuition. Students can take advantage of this offer beginning the summer before their senior year. Students who earn a B or better in their first class are eligible for a second tuition-free course in the fall or spring of their senior year. Registration, laboratory fees, and the cost of books and supplies are not included. Online classes are not part of this waiver. Students must meet eligibility requirements and complete the admissions process to enroll.

Eligibility requirements:

- High school senior
- Residency in the PSC district
- GPA of at least at 2.5 on a 4-point scale
- Appropriate COMPASS placement test

Admissions Process for All Incoming PSC Students

1. Meet with an academic advisor to complete the admissions application.

2. Take the COMPASS placement test.

To ensure the maximum potential for all students, PSC requires basic skills assessment in the areas of English, reading and math. For a listing of COMPASS test dates, consult the current class schedule or contact Mr. Bailey.

3. Meet with an academic advisor to discuss the COMPASS test results, select an academic program and register for classes.

4. Pay tuition and fees.

Enhancing the Homeschool Education

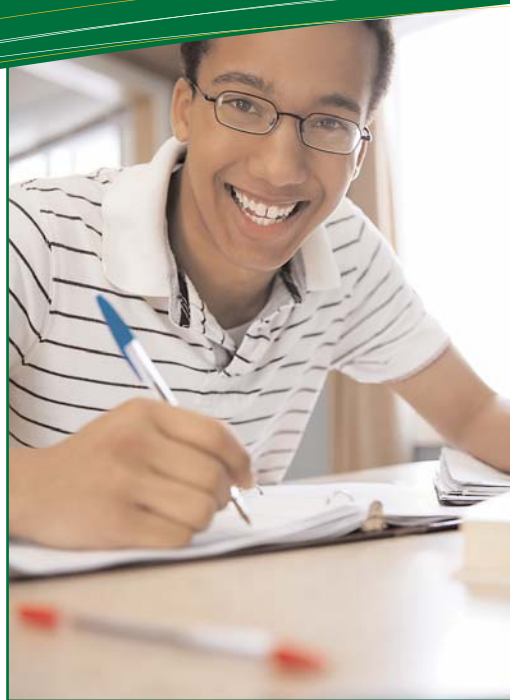
